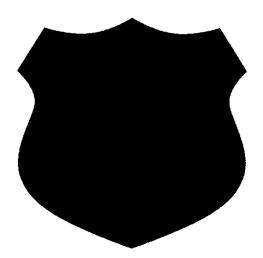


In accordance with the cooperative agreement between the Lafayette County Board of County Commissioners and the Florida Forest Service, we are pleased to submit this report covering the activities of the Forest Protection Program and the Cooperative Forestry Assistance Program for the 2012-2013 fiscal year covering the period of July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013.

Introduction

The mission of the Florida Forest Service is to protect Florida and its people from the dangers of wildland fire and manage the forest resources through a stewardship ethic to assure they are available for future generations. The strategies employed to accomplish our mission are:

- Provide leadership to protect forests, wildlands, and the public from the destructive effects of wildfire.
- Promote sound forest management practices, which maintain the integrity of the environment and provide for Florida's future natural resource needs.
- Educate the public about the importance of Florida's forests and promote the renewal and protection of these resources.
- Manage public lands for their unique character and to provide multiple public benefits.
- Encourage Florida's communities to establish and perpetuate their urban forest.
- Encourage family forest owners to attain their forestland management goals with guidance and technical assistance that promotes good land stewardship principles.
- Improve the quality of service through the training and development of our people our single greatest resource. This leadership will encourage innovation, excellence and freedom for personal growth.



Forest Protection Program

The Florida Forest Service provides wildland fire protection in Lafayette County through a cooperative agreement with the county. This agreement ensures a complete understanding of the commitment between Lafayette County and the Florida Forest Service for emergency response. The county operating plan is a working document that outlines the capabilities and responsibilities of each cooperating agency including the timber cooperators. The public benefits when all agencies establish coordinated efforts to handle the same emergency. Additionally, we look for support from emergency service organizations to implement wildland/urban interface mitigation programs throughout the entire year. With the help of the county commission, we will ensure the citizens have the protection they need from wildland fires.

The Florida Forest Service maintains three Type-2 tractor-plow units (Figure 1), one Type-1 tractor (Figure 2), one 5,000 gallon water tender and a 750 gallon brush patrol to suppress and scout wildland fires within the county. Also, the Florida Forest Service Rural Community Fire Protection program continues to provide equipment to fire departments at little or no cost to help them meet their emergency response needs.

Wildfire Activity

Fire occurrence in Lafayette County was at a normal level last fiscal year. Florida Forest Service personnel responded to 16 wildfires that burned a total of 25.5 acres. These numbers represent a significant decrease from the 21 wildfires and 477 acres burned the previous fiscal year. This decrease can be attributed to continued fire prevention efforts and increased rainfall. The table shown below provides a breakdown of the number of fires and acres burned by cause during fiscal year 2012-2013.

Open Burning Program

Through the administration of the state's outdoor burning program, the Florida Forest Service issues burning authorizations for agricultural, silvicultural and land clearing purposes to the residents of Lafayette County. Through this process, the FFS is better able to regulate and ensure proper and safe outdoor burning. During the past fiscal year in Lafayette County, 924 burn authorizations were issued for a total of 5,121 acres and 3,589 pile burns. Of these authorizations, 375 were issued for silvicultural and agricultural purposes.

Florida Forest Service personnel conduct compliance checks on all first time authorized burners and also at random on repeat burners. This practice helps to ensure that all burners are aware of the laws and know the requirements of legal burning. These compliance checks also help to reduce the number of health related smoke complaints and provide a wildfire prevention benefit as well. In addition, on-site inspections are often made by FFS personnel prior to the issuance of a burn permit to ensure compliance with safe burning practices and requirements. Both the health and safety of Lafayette County residents are of major concern, and we take continuous steps to mitigate the health and safety issues that are associated with any burn.

The Florida Forest Service also offers pre-suppression fireline construction and prescribed burning services to private landowners. These services help to minimize the impacts of wildfire and reduce hazardous fuel build-up. This past fiscal year, pre-suppression efforts included 15 plowing requests for a total of 452 acres protected and four burn assists for a total of 1,395 acres protected.

Fire Prevention

The Florida Forest Service was very active in fire prevention efforts in Lafayette County in fiscal year 2012-2013. Among the programs and events in which we participated were Pioneer Day, the Lafayette High School Homecoming Parade, 4-H and Smokey Bear programs at several schools including Lighthouse Christian Academy, Learning Corner, Mayo Learning Center and Lafayette Elementary School.

San Pedro Bay Landowners Association

The San Pedro Bay Landowners Association (SPBLA) consists of landowners, land managers, state agencies, county governments, and other interested parties working together as a unified team in forest resource protection. SPBLA members share a common interest in managing, protecting and promoting forest resources in and around the San Pedro Bay area with a stewardship ethic to ensure that these resources will be available for future generations. The role of the Florida Forest Service is to provide technical assistance to the members of the SPBLA. During the past fiscal year, the annual SPBLA meeting was held on April 11th at the Florida Department of Transportation facility in Perry.

Cooperative Forestry Assistance Program

The services provided by the county forester range from simple tree species identification and insect/disease diagnosis to the completion of comprehensive, multiple-use forest management plans for the private, non-industrial forest landowners of Lafayette County. Also included in the responsibilities of the county forester are public information and education, administration of federal cost-share programs, state lands management, and wildfire suppression assistance. Below is a brief overview of the accomplishments in Lafayette County for the past fiscal year.

Landowner Assistance

During the 2012-2013 fiscal year, the county forester made numerous assists to the residents of Lafayette County involving over 14,310 acres of land. 118 of these were field assists by the county forester to forest landowners and homeowners. These field assists included the development of forest management plans, reforestation projects, seedling sales, insect and disease detection and suppression, assistance in marketing forest products, prescribed burning, water quality enhancement advice and economic/taxation information.

An additional 112 assists were considered incidental assists. An incidental assist is any activity or recommendation not involving a field visit. These assists are typically handled by phone, office visit or mail, and they consume a significant number of hours over the course of a year.

Forest Information and Education

The county forester conducted nine forestry and environmental education programs during the past fiscal year. More than 900 student contacts were made at events which included the FFA State Forestry Contest, the FFA Summer Camp at O'leno State Park, agriculture classes taught at Lafayette High School and local 4-H events. In addition, forest information activities included several news articles submitted to the Mayo Free Press that kept Lafayette County residents informed about various forestry related topics.

The county forester also assisted with several Smokey Bear programs in the local schools and libraries. These programs are designed to help teach young children the importance of wildfire prevention for the community and environment.

Forest Health

Southern pine beetle activity in Lafayette County has been very limited in recent years. During the past fiscal year, occurrence of the less aggressive species of bark beetles, ips engraver and black turpentine beetles, was reported and contained with minimal loss to forest resources. The county forester completed 16 forest health inspections that totaled 340 acres in the 2012-2013 fiscal year. These inspections involved various insect identifications as well as pitch canker and fusiform rust diagnoses.

Federal Assistance Programs

The Forest Stewardship Program encourages forest landowners to practice multiple-use resource management. This program provides a wide array of technical assistance and management advice

through a comprehensive forest management plan available to landowners at no cost or obligation. There are currently 66 Lafayette County landowners involved in the Forest Stewardship Program for a total of 11,712 acres.

The Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) also provides an opportunity for technical advice and cost-sharing assistance to Lafayette County's forest landowners. It is primarily focused on wildlife management with an emphasis on timber stand improvement and invasive exotic plant species control. This past fiscal year, five landowners signed up for forestry related EQIP practices in Lafayette County. This program is administered through the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) office, and the county forester provides technical advice on recommended forestry practices.

The Southern Pine Beetle Prevention Cost Share is a program that focuses on reducing the risks of southern pine beetle outbreaks by encouraging proactive forest management. It provides funds for thinning operations, underbrush removal, prescribed burning and the planting of longleaf pine. This program focuses on longleaf planting due to the species natural resistance to southern pine beetle. During the past fiscal year, five landowners have applied for the cost share program totaling 322 acres.

The American Tree Farm program certifies landowners as a sustainable producer of timber and requires a multiple resource plan. This past fiscal year, the county forester certified or recertified two tree farms encompassing 13,040 acres.

State Lands Management

The Florida Forest Service is not the lead management agency on any state owned land within Lafayette County. However, assistance is extended to other state agencies such as the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and the Suwannee River Water Management District. The county forester occasionally assists with timber management activities and insect/disease identification and control on these properties.

Training

The county forester also attended 128 hours of training to enable him to better serve the residents of Lafayette County. The bulk of this training was focused on ARC GIS mapping and the use of new technology for the Longleaf Pine geodatabase. Other training included GIS mapping, CFA programs and insect and disease detection.

Conclusion

The primary goal of the CFA project in Lafayette County for the new fiscal year remains unchanged. Through the office of the county forester, the Florida Forest Service will continue to increase the visibility of the services which are provided to the citizens of Lafayette County. Through this exposure, more people will be made aware of the value and importance of timber production and natural resource management.

The Florida Forest Service is proud of the investment it has made in the natural resources of Lafayette County and its ability to assist the residents of the county. Fire prevention and suppression will continue to be a major focus of this agency due to an ever increasing population. Through the cooperative forestry agreement, we will continue to provide sound forest management advice to both the citizens and local governments of Lafayette County.

It is our policy to maintain an effective level of service and make any necessary improvements as needs are identified to serve the citizens of Lafayette County. For that reason, the Board of County Commissioners of Lafayette County is requested to provide comments or suggestions to assist the Florida Forest Service in providing the best service possible.

Dear Commissioner Lamb:

Patrick Howard, grant manager for the County's contract, met with representatives of the County on July 31, 2013, to monitor the CDBG project identified above. This letter, which contains no findings and no concerns, is a summary of that visit. Monitoring includes an examination of documents related to the project for compliance with the CDBG program rules, state statutes, and federal regulations and viewing the construction site(s) if sufficient work has been completed. The following areas were monitored for compliance:

- Audit Review
- Equal Employment Opportunity and Section 3 Requirements
- Fair Housing Requirements
- Financial Management Transaction Testing
- Housing Rehabilitation/Temporary Relocation/National Objective
- Program Administration

The following is a summary of the monitoring activities and the conclusions that were reached.

Audit Review

A Single Audit under Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133 must be performed and submitted to the Department for any Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) during which the subgrant was open and the total of all federal funds that your community expended during the year was at least \$500,000. Audit reports are due to the Department by June 30 following the end of the fiscal year for which an audit was required. The audit is submitted to ensure compliance with all federal and state regulations and to ensure that the local government has taken corrective actions in response to findings from a previous audit report, if applicable.

The audit for FFY 2012 was submitted and is currently being reviewed. There are no issues.

Equal Employment Opportunity, Section 504/ADA Requirements and Section 3

Recipients of federal funds must comply with Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) requirements. The monitoring consisted of a review of the County's employment policy, employment advertising and hiring practices.

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 USC 794) required recipients of federal funds to complete a self-evaluation of their physical facilities and to make all public facilities handicap accessible by July 1, 1991. The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, as amended, (Title II, 28 CFR 35, and Title III, 28 CFR 36) prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in employment, state and local government services, public accommodations, commercial facilities, transportation, and telecommunications. Section 504/ADA issues were not monitored during this visit because the County was found to be in compliance with state and federal requirements during the first monitoring visit.

The grant manager checked to make sure that the County had designated a coordinator for EEO, published the contact information as required, and established and maintained a system for tracking EEO complaints.

The grant manager reviewed compliance with Section 3 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1968 (24 CFR 135). Section 3 requires recipients of United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funds and the contractors they employ to make efforts to ensure economic opportunities generated by HUD funds are open to local low-income residents and businesses owned and operated by low-income persons.

There were no findings or concerns related to Equal Employment Opportunity, Section 504/ADA Requirements or Section 3.

Fair Housing Requirements

The County's Fair Housing Ordinance and all activities conducted in accordance with Attachment K to the subgrant agreement were reviewed. Compliance with Sections 760.20 through 760.37, Florida Statutes, and Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 was also reviewed. The County has developed a public information program using presentations, printed materials and newpaper media to inform all segments of the community of their Fair Housing rights and responsibilities. The County has also designated a Fair Housing Coordinator, published contact information as required, and established and maintained a system for tracking Fair Housing complaints.

The County has completed the following Fair Housing activities since the last monitoring visit:

Fourth Quarter 2012 – A Fair Housing presentation was made at the local Chamber of Commerce. First Quarter 2013 – A Fair Housing display advertisement was placed in the April 18, 2013, edition of the local newspaper.

Second Quarter 2013 - Fair Housing flyers given to local churches for distribution.

There were no findings or concerns related to Fair Housing Requirements.

Financial Management Transaction Testing

A random sample of Requests for Funds (RFFs) was traced through the financial management system to verify the basis upon which the requests were made. The grant manager traced the canceled checks for these RFFs through the County's financial management system to ensure it maintained proper documentation (invoices, payment vouchers, detailed journal entries and ledger postings). RFFs numbers 6, 11 and 14 were reviewed. Additionally, the grant manager traced the following transactions through your system:

There were no findings or concerns noted under the area of Financial Management Transaction Testing.

Housing Rehabilitation/Temporary Relocation/National Objective

The grant application proposed to rehabilitate or demolish and replace 10 homes within the County's jurisdiction. At the time of monitoring, 10 homes were completed, no homes were under contract, and no homes were out for bids. The grant manager checked to make sure that each home was occupied by a low-or moderate-income (LMI) person, meeting the LMI national objective.

The grant manager reviewed three rehabilitation files for compliance with program requirements, including consistency with your Housing Assistance Plan. Each file was examined to determine if the County had conducted a site specific environmental review on the property prior to work beginning and was reviewing the status of work prior to making a payment to the contractor. He also checked to make sure that each unit was properly inspected during construction and upon completion, and that a certificate of occupancy or other similar document was issued.

The grant manager reviewed files to ensure that only qualified, licensed contractors were performing construction work, as required by state law. If applicable, the files were reviewed for compliance with the County's relocation policy, including any temporary relocation activity and expenditure of CDBG funds in excess of the amounts set forth in the County's Housing Assistance Plan.

An escrow account was established for this project. It was reviewed to determine that the funds are being disbursed on a timely basis, that they are maintained in an interest bearing account, and that the interest earned is returned to the Department on a quarterly basis.

There were no findings or concerns related to Housing Rehabilitation activities.

Program Administration

This review focuses on whether the County has a project management system that complies with program requirements. The grant manager reviewed the filing system and record retention procedures for compliance with 24 CFR 570.490(b), (c), and (d). Project progress was compared to the *Activity Work Plan* to determine if performance and expenditures were on time. The County has completed the project and anticipates submitting the Administrative Closeout in October.

The grant manager was able to document that \$144,587.46 of leverage funds had been spent. This satisfies the County's leverage requirements for this project. He also observed that the County had not received any citizen complaints related to the project.

There were no findings or concerns noted under the area of Program Administration.

The County must continue to administer the subgrant according to federal and state laws, the program rules, and sound management practices. At this time, no additional monitoring visits are planned.
